NOTES

This grid outlines a *suggested* course of study. Please note that while these courses are normally offered each year, and in the semesters designated, there are occasionally exceptions. Students in denominational and ISM certificate programs are reminded to check with their program's advisor for additional requirements such as colloquia. Students are encouraged to take a course of study that, while fulfilling degree requirements, also focuses on the student's area(s) of interest and/or formation goals. Please talk with your advisor to help tailor your course of study to both meet degree requirements and fulfill your study aspirations. If you aspire to ordination, consult with denominational representatives to ensure that you are fulfilling special requirements, such as denominational polity course requirements or biblical languages. Try to tailor your first few semesters—especially your first year-- so that it is a manageable undertaking for you, taking into account your background preparation and preferred modes of learning. A goal of the first year might be to build a solid foundation for seminar courses in your second and third years.

* Designates required courses. In the History of Christianity sequence, M.Div. students must take two courses out of four possible options:

REL 712 History of Early Christianity: Origins and Growth

REL 713 History of Medieval Christianity: Learning, Faith and Conflict

REL 714 History of Early Modern Christianity: Reformation to Enlightenment

REL 715 History of Modern Christianity: American Encounters, Postmodern Transformations

Note that non-starred courses are not requirements but suggestions for a possible course of study toward the M.Div. degree.

A typical full-time course of study includes twelve credit hours per term. Students in their first semester are strongly discouraged from registering for more than fourteen credit hours of study.

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
